



Rattlesnake Bites The Dog The Dos, The Don'ts, And The Mumbo Jumbo Myths By Shea Cox DVM, July 2012



We all love to bask in the California sun and rattlesnakes are no exception. Snakebite envenomation is something that is frequently seen in the ER, in fact, we treated three pets for this *just this past weekend alone!* Sadie, an 11-week old Cocker Spaniel, was one of those patients. She was gardening with her Mom when a rattlesnake bit her.

Poisonous snakes of the United States belong to two groups: pit vipers and elapids. Pit vipers are the largest group and include at least 26 subspecies of rattlesnakes (*Crotalus* spp.), with the Western Rattlesnake being the most common in our region. Click:

How does the venom work?

An understanding of the function of venom is helpful in appreciating how envenomation works. The snake uses its venom to immobilize the victim and predigest body tissues. There are over 50 types of enzymes in pit viper venom, *with a minimum of 10 in any individual snakes venom.* Additionally, there are many other non-enzymes present in the venom, called *killing fractions,* which are **50 times more toxic** than the "crude" venom. When the venom destroys the body tissues, it is possible for up to 1/3 of a pet's body fluid to be lost into the tissue spaces within several hours, which can result in life-threatening drops in blood pressure resulting in shock.

What makes a bad bite worse?

Several factors influence the severity of snakebites. The most important factors are the volume of venom injected and the toxicity of the venom itself. Other factors include:

• The amount of regenerated venom since the last bite: there is more venom and it is more concentrate if the snake hasn't bitten in a while.

o The age of the snake: younger snakes have more "potent" venom.

- o Aggressiveness of the snake: the more threatened they feel, the more concentrated the venom.
- o Motivation of the snake: offensive strikes are more severe.

• The size of the pet being bitten: smaller dogs and cats are more severely affected than large dogs due to their small body size to venom ratio (less body to "absorb" the amount of venom).

o The size of the bite.

• The location of the bite: the "best" place to be bitten is in the legs or face as the regional swelling and changes in the local blood supply can actually slow the uptake of the venom; envenomation to the body is more concerning as the broader area allows for the venom to be absorbed more rapidly; bites to the tongue are the worst and result in rapid and devastating clinical signs.

o The time elapsed from bite until seeking medical treatment.

The amount of physical activity since the time of the bite.

What are the general signs of a snakebite wound?

Snakebites are not always easy to diagnose, especially if it was an unobserved bite and if a pet has a heavy hair coat that may hide puncture wounds. With pit viper bites, you can usually see bleeding puncture wounds and single or multiple puncture sites may be observed. The initial signs are marked swelling, which is due to the tissue destruction and body fluid "leaking" into the damaged area (see the picture of the little Chihuahua, showing a what a typical bite to the face looks like). Clinical signs may develop immediately or be delayed for several hours. Bruising and skin discoloration often occurs within hours of the bite because the venom causes the blood to not clot. There is usually intense and immediate pain at the site of the bite, which helps differentiate snakebites from other causes of swelling, and swelling is generally progressive for up to 36 hours. You can also see collapse, vomiting, muscle tremors, and depression in breathing.

What to do if a snake bites your pet:

- o If your pet is bitten by a snake, it is best to assume it is a venomous bite.
- o Seek veterinary attention as soon as possible!

o If the swelling is not in the face, muzzle your pet (if you can do it safely) to avoid being bitten: snake bites are very painful and your pet may unintentionally snap at you; if the swelling is in the face, avoid touching this area all together.

o Immobilize the part of your pet that has been bitten by the snake, if this can be done safely; try to keep the area at or below the level of the heart.

o Keep your pet calm and immobile, carry if necessary.

What NOT to do (and the mumbo jumbo myths)

o Do not try to suck out the venom! (This technique only works for John Wayne in old Western movies).

o Do not attempt to "make an X" and cut open the area around the bite (you will only cause a wound).

o Do not bother to use a Snake Bite Kit or Extractor Pump (they will actually do more harm to your pet- and your wallet!).

o Do not apply ice to the area: this constricts the blood vessels locally and actually concentrates the venom causing severe muscle damage to the area.

o Do not rub any substances into the bite: the venom has entered the blood stream, and any substance applied topically is ineffectual.

o Do not apply a tourniquet: you will only succeed in causing further tissue damage and possibly create a need for limb amputation.

o Do not allow your pet to move about freely.

Do not attempt to capture the snake for later identification (you'd be surprised...)

Tips for prevention:

o Stay on open paths while hiking with your pet.

o Keep your pets on leash away from high grass and rocky outcrops where snakes like to rest.

o Don't let your pet explore holes or dig under rocks.

o Keep an open ear for that telltale rattling noise and keep your pet at your side until you determine where the sound is coming from, and then move slowly away.

o If you see a snake that sees you, remember that a snake can strike only a distance of half its body length; give the snake time to "just go away" as they are not looking to interact with you or your pet.

o Don't let your pet examine a dead snake as they still can envenomate.

For around your home: cut off the snakes food supply and shelter by mowing close to the house, storing firewood away from the house, plugging up holes in the ground, and limiting birdseed waste which can attract rodents to your home.

What is the treatment?


Since the onset of clinical signs can be delayed for several hours, all pets that have been bitten by a snake should be hospitalized for at least 12 hours and ideally 24 hours. Although most pets generally need to be supported and monitored, the vast majority (95%) do survive with early and proper treatment.

Antivenom is the only proven treatment against pit viper envenomation, and the earlier it is administered, the more effective its action. The biggest downside to antivenom is cost, and it can range anywhere from \$450-\$700 *per vial*. Usually a single vial will control the envenomation but several vials may be necessary, especially in small dogs or cats. Many animals may do "fine" without it, but it does decrease the severity of clinical signs, as well as speed overall recovery with a reduction in complications. Blood work is also recommended to monitor your pet's platelet count as well as clotting times of the blood. IV fluid support, intensive pain management, antibiotics and wound monitoring are required for best clinical outcomes. Blood and plasma transfusions are sometimes needed in severe envenomation.

What about the vaccine?

There is a "snake-bite vaccine" that may be useful, but there have been no controlled studies for its effectiveness. The main benefit of the vaccine is that it may create protective antibodies to neutralize some of the injected venom, and in turn may lessen the severity of the clinical signs. One of the biggest myths is that if your pet has had the vaccine, then they don't need to be treated if they are bitten; this is not true, and *they still require the same treatment despite being given a vaccine or not*!

Thankfully, most snakes will try to avoid you and your pets and typically only bite as a last resort. But if your pet does happen to get bitten by a snake that you think might be venomous, it is best to err on the side of caution and get medical attention immediately. 

JUDGING THE RAT TERRIER


PART TWO - Colors and Patterns

At first it could appear that all the sizes, colors and patterns that make up the Rat Terrier are overwhelming and difficult to understand. Keep in mind that farmers cared little for the conformation and/or patterning of these invaluable rodent killers. However, with the acceptance of the Rat Terrier in AKC and the attempt by breeders to solidify the standard, the multitude of sizes, colors, and markings may have caused some dilemmas for judges. Here we will illustrate the variables to help you understand the dogs you have before you in the ring.


First and foremost, the color and/or pattern are important as they adhere to the standard, but never more important than solid, correct structure. When judging the breed, all color and patterns within the standard are acceptable without prejudice.

THE COAT: The Rat Terrier should always have a short, close lying, smooth and shiny coat. Texture varies, and a very slight ruff or wave along the back is allowed, but undesirable. Any suggestion of kink or curl is cause for disqualification. Whiskers must not be removed.


COLOR: Any variation of pied patterning is acceptable. Pied is described as comparatively large patches of one or more colors in combination with white. Accepted by the parent club, but not seen often is "solid white," extreme piebald dog with only mottled/ spotted skin.

"Tan points" are common and vary in shades of cream to rust.

Acceptable colors with or without "tan points" include predominate black, chocolate, red, apricot, blue, fawn, tan, lemon, or white.

An intense dark shade of color with clearly defined and delineated coloration is preferred.

White on the body is preferred to be between 10 percent and 90 percent. All patterns: spotted, patched or splashed with white in conjunction with (or without) any combination of white on the face, head or ears are equally acceptable without prejudice.




Badger markings are acceptable. These are examples of badger markings of different shades

Sabling is permitted in the coat or as shading on the head or penciling on the toes.

A "black mask /black muzzle" on a dog that does not have black as coloration is to be seriously faulted.

If any Rat Terrier walks into your ring and it does not have one spot of white at least 1" wide, it's a disqualification.

Color Disqualifications:

- Absence of coat (total genetic hairlessness)
- Brindle or merle color patterns
- Rat Terriers are never a solid ground color without white markings or bi-colored without one color being white.
- Less than one inch of white at its widest dimension is a disqualification


While it is easy to succumb to personal preference regarding color and patterning, especially when confronted with multiple dogs covering the entire range of both, judges must focus on the complete dog and adherence to the standard and accept those colors and patterns as delineated above without prejudice.



A few white hairs do not constitute an acceptable marking. A minimum white marking consists of a patch or strip of white with underlying white/ pink skin on the fore chest or body that exceeds one inch.



Training Your Puppy for Conformation Shows

Lesson 1 - 'Watch Me'

One of the first things that I teach a puppy is to 'watch me'.

To do this, stand in front of your dog with a treat that they really love in your closed fist. Let them smell it, and then hold your arm up at shoulder height, stretched right out to the full length of your arm. This exercise can be done with or without a leash. In the beginning I use a show lead so that the puppy will associate the lead with getting treats.

At first your puppy will jump at your outstretched arm trying to get the treat. Ignore him. Continue to ignore him until he glances at you. This may take some time and patience on your part, but once he gets it he will learn quickly.

Reward him/her for even the quickest little glance up at you. You may use a clicker for this exercise, or a word like 'yes' said enthusiastically to mark the exact moment that he looked up at you.

This is a fun exercise and one that you both will come to enjoy. You may find that one arm gets tired holding the bait up and out while waiting for his attention. Use the other arm and consider this your exercise (smile).

Continue to do this a couple of times a day. For however long it takes for him/her to learn to watch you. When he looks right into your eyes, you may extend the giving of the reward for longer periods of time. Now you are ready to add the command **'watch me'**.

The **'watch me'** command is one that will come in handy many times during your puppies show career. Each time his attention wanders in the show ring, you say **'watch me'** and voila', you have his attention back on you and the bait.

Next he will learn to concentrate on your bait pocket in much the same way as he concentrates on looking at you. You can teach this exactly the same way. This is a personal choice. Not necessary, but I like a dog to go into 'show mode' when my hand goes to my pocket. This is very useful in rings where the judges preference is NO BAIT. By having a dog that turns on just by putting your hand in your pocket, you are one step ahead of the crowd. The competition looks kind of dumb founded when they run across a judge the slaps your hand if you try to bait your dog.....it happens!!!

Once the puppy understands **'watch me'**, it is a short trip to learning to watch the pocket from which comes all those wonderful surprises that puppies love. A really focused dog will look right into your eyes at the watch me command, then glance at your pocket and then back at your eyes. This is the beginning of a SHOW DOG.

We also learn to play catch very young. This usually follows the **'watch me'** lessons. I use popcorn to teach a puppy to catch. I aim the piece of popcorn between his eyes. For the first few times it will ping him in the forehead and he will look kind of stunned. Make a game of it, and if by chance he does catch it, make a big deal of it by telling him/her how great they are. Repeat often.

Lesson 2- 'Stand'

I usually start puppies around 4 weeks of age, as soon as they can stand.

I start them by standing them on the grooming table and cuddling them, playing with them and just plain loving them. Making this a fun experience. Then I just kind of place them 4 square. More loving and laughing, and cuddling, and that is the lesson for today.

If you did not breed your pup, but purchased it from a reputable breeder as a show prospect, odds are that what I do above is also done by your breeder. You will want to carry on teaching the stand/ stack as the puppy grows.

Here is how you go about doing just that. A good time to begin formal show training is around three to four months of age. Prior to this time, any standing or stacking is playtime.

For the purpose of these show training lessons, we will assume that your puppy is lead trained. I will offer references on lead training at the end of these lessons. Puppies should never be dragged or forced to do something. You should develop methods that encourage proper behaviour rather than punishing poor behaviour.

The training methods that I employ work well for all ages. I train our dogs to show on the floor and only use the table for young puppies. Should you be training a breed that is shown on the table, these methods should work well too.

'Stand' is the second exercise that I teach. The most important part of the stand exercise is what I like to call **head control**. If you have control over the head then you are able to control more easily where the rest of the parts go.

Choose a word to use when placing a leg. Some people use the word 'place' as they set the leg where they want it. I use the word 'step'. You will see in later lessons why I use the 'step' command.

Next, I hold the head firmly, by the muzzle with the left hand. Then, with your right hand hold the right elbow of the dog and place it straight down, pointing your finger downwards as you do this and giving the command that you have chosen for this exercise. Change hands. Now you are using your right hand to control the head as you place the left leg by the elbow.

Using your right hand under the jaw for head control, reach back with the left hand as you put each rear foot in the proper place. Use another word that you have chosen for this particular part of the stand exercise. I use the word **'foot' or 'back foot'**. In the first few lessons, the feet don't have to be in perfect position.

Imagine a drawing of a rectangle on the floor.

'Place' a front foot on the inside of each of the two upper corners. On the back corners, place the feet on the outer corners of the rectangle. Make sure feet are pointed forward. Hocks should be straight up and down not slanted inwards or outwards. **Toes forward**.

What you are teaching here is the words and commands and relating them to the movements that they refer to. It won't take long before your puppy understands what you want. Make this fun and when the puppy is standing comfortably, even if just for a second or two....reward him/her. Praise praise praise. They love to be told how good they are.

Another great aid in teaching a puppy to stand are 'stacking blocks'. These are available from

http://www.happylegs.com

Lesson 3- 'Stay'

Next we include the stay while standing. Once I have puppy standing, I add the word 'stay'. Then in future lessons as I increase the standing time, I use the words 'stand stay'.

A happy **'Okay'** is the way the puppy knows that I am releasing him/her from the command followed by praise praise praise and a reward.

This is now play time. Time to let the puppy know that this is fun, and he/she has been very good.

As the puppy becomes more accustomed to having his legs placed you can stop using the commands if you want. I continue to use them as later I may want the dog to move a certain foot and he will know what I expect. Your puppy will soon learn to stand/stay. It is my belief that obedience and show training go hand in hand, in fact they compliment one another. Many breeders go nuts when you tell them you have your **'show prospect'** in obedience classes!

Show training is just another form of Obedience training. Our dogs are smart enough to distinguish the difference. As you train, your dogs will learn what you expect and you will find that they differentiate between collars/leads. They also watch your body language. Funny enough, though you may not realize it, you move and posture differently depending on what it is you are asking your dog to do.

If you have a breed that should have its tail up while stacked, now is the time to begin teaching him/ her to do this. After placing the rear legs in position, slowly bring your hand up under the tail and gently tickle with finger tips saying **'tail up'** in a happy voice. Should the puppy resist having its tail touched you must then start touching his tail as often as you can during his daily routine.

While eating, or sleeping, going for a walk or just playing, reach down and tickle under his tail. Remember to say **'tail up'** each time you touch the tail. Even if the tail is up during these occasions, tickle the underside, it is good practice.

Soon it will become old hat to him and he will no longer resist having his tail put into the **'tail up'** position during a stack. In fact, in no time at all he will be holding the tail up the moment the show lead comes into view. Keep it fun and talk in a happy happy voice. I have even trained one of mine to **'wag wag'** on command. A neat trick, and easily done.

Once you think your pup understands what you want during the stand/stay with tail up exercise, you will be ready to move on to the next part of the show training exercise.

Lesson 4- 'Baiting'

Baiting while stacked. This differs from Free baiting.

To teach your pup to bait while stacked choose a word and use the same word each time.

Your mirror will help you teach this to your dog and show you what both you and your dog look like while baiting.

First lets understand why we bait a dog after we have hand stacked them. This isn't necessary for many breeds that are shown by freebaiting, but for some breeds, where competition is pretty stiff, this exercise, if taught correctly, can be what give you the winning edge. You want your dog to look his/her very best at exactly the moment that the judge looks at him. You want your dog to show his best features, making the most of the good features he has while minimizing where he is lacking.

When I start this with a young dog, I use stacking blocks. These can be seen at <u>http://</u><u>www.happylegs.com</u> or you can make your own. Some people even use 4 cans of vegetables as stacking blocks. Whatever works for you and your dog! It is possible to teach this without using stacking blocks, but it takes longer and is more difficult to get the message across to the dog. Many pups want to lean forward, which creates a slope to the topline and does funny things to the rear angles. This is NOT what you want. Watch your mirror!

With Mr. Puppy on the stacking blocks, practice what you have learned up to now. Stack the pup, placing each leg as taught in prior lessons. Go slowly and smoothly, from one leg to the next, main-taining head control at all times. Perhaps we need a section on 'head control'? Let me know if you don't understand what this is.

Once puppy is stacked, slowly lift his/her head and THEN bring the collar up to the under the ears position. Then and only then do you hold the collar. You do NOT hold the puppy's head up with the collar while stacking him/her. By doing this you will create a dog that leans into the collar and looks awful while doing so.

Now, puppy is all together, standing nicely on the blocks in the correct position for his/her breed with head held high and collar in position. Tail up too if that is required in your breed. Tickle under tail and say "tail up" while placing it in the proper position.

We are now ready to bait this puppy. What you are attempting to do is use the bait to bring the pup up on his toes and arch his neck without losing the proper stack. Not an easy task. And on top of this, we want you to do all this and make it look easy and natural. Ready?

From the non show side towards the front of the dog.....I put my left hand on the pup's chest, about where the breast bone is to keep them from leaning. I then use the word 'show', holding the liver in my right hand with the liver slightly in front of the nose, away from the body in line with the dogs nose.

In the beginning, I have to keep going back and lifting the pups head, bringing the collar up and showing the bait at nose level. They are over excited at this point. You do not want to discourage this, just tone it down slightly <grin>. Keep training sessions short and fun.

In time, I hold the bait further away from the pup, and if he tries to lean, I push on his chest. He will eventually understand that you want him to stay in position and stretch his neck. This will come, be patient.

It won't take long, you will be able to say what ever word you are using for this exercise and your pup will stand up on his toes and stretch his neck looking for that bait. Once he understands that you want him to remain standing/stacked while receiving his 'treat' then you can work at getting him to arch his neck at the appropriate time (when the judge is trying to make up his mind between your dog and another dog)

Now you should be able to go back to stacking your pup.....bringing the collar up, and then baiting your dog....all in one smooth easy step.

Take your bait from your pocket while holding your dog in position, with bait in your right hand and left hand holding the collar, bait your dog. Where you hold the liver will determine how your dog looks. How he arches his neck and how he concentrates on that bait.

Your pup has learned to stay in a prior lesson so this should be easy. He should be concentrating on that bait and doing exatcly what you want.

Once your dog is steady at this and understands totally what is expected, try dropping the collar and see what happens......he should still be so engrossed in the bait that he has no idea that you have released his collar. He will still be in perfect position, up on his toes and arching his neck.

In the beginning, don't make him stand there too long. Release him by praising him and using a silly voice, clapping and laughing. Make it lots of fun. Make it a big game. He will then not only anticipate the bait, but will anticipate being released and played with by someone he adores....you!!

When you are sure that you pup knows what is expected. Try stacking the pup and baiting him on the ground as well as on the stacking blocks.

One more thing......do not continually move the bait while holding it in front of your dog. Too many novice handlers have the poor dog jecking his head up and down following that piece of bait. Never say no during this exercise. If you get frustrated Quit!! Try it again another day. Do not show displeasure to your pup at anytime during show training. This should be fun, fun, fun!! Never work!

Handling should be done smoothly. The handler should not be obvious, he/she is there to present the dog. The dog is the one that should stand out, not the handler.

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Re-Run of Important seasonal information ~ Water Intoxication/Poisoning ~ Siryn's Story Could Save Your Dog

I wanted to share what I learned in case it could help someone else because many people and vets may not have have had experience with this. Basically, water intoxication is a potentially fatal disturbance in brain functions that results when the normal balance of electrolytes in the body is pushed outside of safe limits by excessive water consumption in a short period of time. The cells absorb all the water, causing the tissues, including the brain, to swell. When the cell membranes can no longer withstand the pressure, the cells can begin to die. Water intoxication can lead to brain damage, heart failure, and death. The famous artist, Andy Warhol, died from cardiac arrhythmia, a direct result of water intoxication after hospital staff overloaded him with fluids after routine gallbladder surgery. Athletes are also prone to this if they replace lost fluids with large quantities of water without added electrolytes.

I'll list my story below, but the please read this for signs and treatment as the vet you end up with may not be as educated as my vet friend was. Early signs of a problem can include mild lethargy, nausea, and slight weight gain resulting in a bloated appearance. Later symptoms, noting that Siryn went from no significant signs to major distress in about 15 minutes, may include neurological signs such as a loss of coordination (tripping, falling, or collapsing), dilated pupils, and glazed eyes or lack of awareness of their surroundings. They may also have difficulty breathing, have an increased heart rate, be restless, have excessive salivation, have poor color in their gums, and even have seizures or slip into a coma.

TIME IS CRITICAL. If your dog is showing signs of water intoxication, get them to a vet immediately. The vet needs to run bloodwork and it will show very low electrolytes. Some of the other values, like the kidneys, may be "off", too, but this is a result of the electrolyte imbalance. The vet needs to immediately start the dog on a slow drip of IV sodium chloride fluids and with Siryn, they added potassium to it. The fluids need to be given slowly because the goal is not to hydrate the dog but to slowly put the electrolytes back in the system. Here is another key piece the emergency clinic vet didn't know about that my vet told her to do. Give the dog a diuretic, such as Lasix, to help pull the fluid out of the tissue. I believe this was the key to Siryn recovering to normal bloodwork values in 9-10 hours while another friend's dog with this condition who wasn't given Lasix was in the hospital for 2 days. There are more lessons about dealing with the vets in my story below.


Siryn has been swimming all her life and never had this problem. She does not bite at the water and she does not stand there and gulp down the water. She will sometimes bark or whine in the water because she's so excited and probably takes in water when she does that and I would imagine she also ingests quite a bit of water when she's fetching. I don't know why yesterday was different. My friend Val saw her vomit up several cups of something that looked like water logged dog food. I have no idea where that came from since she eats raw. Perhaps she found it while we were walking. The only thing I can think of to make this trip different is that the dog food absorbed all the water and didn't let it pass through her system like it normally does, though I'll never know for sure. My vet said she could be more prone to this happening in the future now that it's happened once so I will have to be careful with her, watch her for starting to look bloated, and make her take breaks.

Here's my story:

Val and I took the dogs swimming and fetching at the lake for an hour or two yesterday evening. When we were done, Siryn looked bloated, but that's normal for her after swimming for a while. She always swallows a lot of water and either vomits it up or urinates a lot for the next couple hours. Val said her face even looked a little bloated yesterday. After swimming, we went for a walk. We'd walked about a mile when I noticed that Siryn wasn't walking right. She was tripping over her feet and starting to lose her balance. Val suggested I put her in the water to see if she was hot but it didn't help. We checked her color and her gums were white. Within minutes, she was having a hard time walking and within a few minutes after that, she couldn't stand at all so I had to carry her. We waited for Val to run back and get the car. Her breathing was raspy and labored, she was panting heavily, she started excessively salivating, and she couldn't stand or sit. Her eyes were glazed and her pupils were dilated.

We rushed her to the emergency clinic where the technician was so not good. She checked Siryn out, saw her have no color to her gums, unable to stand, panting, with dilated eyes, and told us she would put us in a room for a while until the doctor could see us. Val said she checked her own pulse instead of Siryn's! I told her the doctor either needed to see my dog (who still couldn't stand up!) right away or I was going to take her and find a vet who would see her. She said she'd take her to the back and maybe put her on oxygen or something (not helpful). Apparently, when the doctor saw her, she recognized she was in shock and started treating her immediately.

I think not all, but a lot of the vets who work the night and weekend shifts at the emergency clinics are new in practice (who else wants to work weekend overnights?!) and may not have a lot of experience. This vet figured out to put her on slow fluids with the additives, but it took having my awesome vet (thanks Laura Beth!) calling her to suggest Lasix to really get the ball rolling. The emergency vet also was thinking perhaps Siryn had Addison's Disease based on her bloodwork but my vet was able to tell her that she's known Siryn all her life and she's never shown any signs of that and that she needed to just treat her for water intoxication and stop looking for other things that it could be.

Siryn was groaning while she was lying on the table and the vet asked me if she normally did that. I told her no and she started saying that it might be a sign of something else and we might need to do x-rays. I told her that Siryn was probably miserable because she was so fat at that time from all the water in her body. She looked at me and asked, incredulously,"This is fat for her?" It was kind of laughable because Siryn is an in shape competition dog and very thin compared to the fat pet dogs most vets are used to seeing. So what was obvious to me as discomfort from severe bloating she didn't see because Siryn looked like the normal weight of dogs she was used to seeing!

Remember, you and your vet know your dog and the emergency vets don't! You have to be ready to speak up, demand an immediate assessment by a doctor if you don't feel the entry staff are giving you proper attention, and educate them about what is and isn't normal for your dog (like the lack of Addison's symptoms and the groaning from being bloated). If she would have started treating for Addison's, we could have gone in the whole wrong direction. I am so lucky my wonderful vet was willing to call up there late in the night and make sure Siryn got the appropriate care.

So, that's my story. Since posting this yesterday, I have heard from several other people who have had dogs have this or who know people who have. I hope this helps educate everyone on a potential problem many don't know exist. I sincerely hope this note won't discourage people from taking their dogs to the water to have fun. Siryn will still go swimming because it's her favorite thing to do and I refuse to keep my dogs in a glass bubble just because something might happen. We are fortunate to have every day we have with each other and I want my dogs to love their life; however, I will be more educated in the future about making each trip as safe as possible.

Instrated Akc. Rat Terrier Breed Standard


Official AKC Standard of the Rat Terrier

General Appearance: The Rat Terrier was originally bred for ratting and farm work. A multipurpose companion dog that is capable of hunting rodents and vermin above and below ground, and to course small game. He is a sturdy, compact, small-to-medium sized parti-colored dog giving the appearance of elegance and fitness, denoting speed, power and balance. Honorable scars or a couple of broken or missing canines or incisors teeth are not to be faulted. The following is a description of the ideal Rat Terrier. Variations are penalized to the extent of the deviation.

Size, Proportion, Substance: *Size* - There are two separate size divisions. Miniature - At least 10 inches, not to exceed 13 inches. Standard - over 13 inches, and up to and including 18 inches in height measured at the withers. Any dog six months of age or older measuring less than 10 inches, or any dog over 18 inches are to be disqualified. *Proportion* - The Rat Terrier is just slightly longer than tall. The height, measured vertically from the ground to the highest point of the withers, is slightly less than the length, measured horizontally from the point of the shoulders to the point of the buttocks. Shortness in leg is a serious fault. *Substance* - Moderate bone in proportion to size. A well-balanced, hard-muscled dog with smooth lines under taut skin. This dog should not be rangy nor fine boned and toyish, and never bulky or coarse. They are shown in good, hard physical working condition.



Head: The *head* resembles a smooth, blunt wedge from a front or profile view. When seen from the front, the head widens gradually towards the base of the ears in an unbroken line and is well filled up under the eyes. The expression is intelligent, alert and full of interest. The eyes are not large. They are obliquely set wide apart and are oval in shape. Eye color varies with coat color from darkest brown to hazel. Eye rim pigmentation corresponds with nose color and facial markings. Gray eyes are acceptable in blue or blue-fawn dogs only, being a serious fault in other colorations. Any blue in the eye(s) is a disgualification. Ears - Set on the top outer edge of the skull, V-shaped, with the length in proportion to the head moderately pointed at the tip. When viewed from the side, the base of the ear is on line with the outer corner of the eye. Ears should match in shape and carriage when alert, and can be carried erect, semi-erect and tipped, or button without preference. When alert, a rose ear is a fault. Cropped ears are a disgualification. **Skull** -When viewed from the front the skull is moderate in width, relatively flat on top, and rounded at crown and the sides as it widens smoothly from the corner of the eyes to the base of the ears. The occiput is not prominent. The cheeks are flat and well-muscled, but never bulging. The stop is moderate but distinct. The *muzzle* is strong, just slightly shorter in length than the skull and tapers smoothly along the sides to the nose. The nose color corresponds with the body color and is entirely pigmented. Flesh-colored noses are considered a fault in lemon or light apricot colorations while being a serious fault in other colorations. Seasonal fading is permitted. The lips are clean and tight, and correspond in color with the nose leather or may be pink; either solid or spotted is acceptable. The lower jaw and teeth are strong and well developed with no sign of being snipey or weak. Bite- A scissor bite is preferred. A level bite is acceptable.



Neck, Topline, Body:

Neck - Length of neck is in proportion to the head. Strong, arched along the crest and dry, the neck blends smoothly into the flat shoulder blades.

Topline - Smooth and blending from the back through the loin and set of the tail.

Body - The body is compact, strong and flexible with well sprung ribs. The brisket extends to the elbow. When viewed from the front, the ribs appear to be oval. The Rat Terrier, while muscled and fit, has flat muscles that blend into the body. The chest is moderately wide and well filled with a discernible forechest. The underline ascends gradually with the ribs extending well back to a moderate tuck-up. Back - The back is level and firm from the withers to the loin. The short loin has a slight muscular arch blending into the gently rounded croup.

Tail - The tail set is a continuation of the spine. Tails are customarily docked between the second and third joint, or can be a natural bobtail or left naturally long and tapering to the hock joint. Length is unimportant. The carriage is variable depending on attitude, carried from slightly below horizontal to almost erect, but not over the back or a ring tail.


Forequarters: The shoulder blades are well laid back with flat muscles providing enough space between the shoulder blades to allow for free movement. The shoulder blades and the upper arms are nearly equal in length and well set back so that the elbows fall directly under the highest point of the shoulder blade. The depth of the body at the elbow is the same distance as from the elbow to the ground. The forelegs stand straight and parallel with elbows turning neither in nor out. The pasterns are slightly sloping when viewed from the side. The feet are oval in shape. The toes turn neither in nor out, are compact, moderately arched, with thick pads and strong nails. The front dewclaws may be removed.

Hindquarters: The hindquarters are muscular but smooth and in balance with the forequarters. They should not be bulging or coarse. Stifles are well-bent with short hocks that are parallel and perpendicular to the ground. The hind feet although slightly smaller are similar to the front feet. Rear dewclaws are removed.


Coat: Short, close lying, smooth and shiny coat. Texture varies; a very slight ruff or wave along the back is allowed, but undesirable. Any suggestion of kink or curl is cause for disqualification. Whiskers must not be removed. Absence of coat (total genetic hairlessness) is a disqualification.

Color: Any variation of pied patterning is acceptable. Pied is described as comparatively large patches of one or more colors in combination with white. Except for the "solid white" extreme piebald dog with only mottled/spotted skin. Disgualification - Rat Terriers are never a solid ground color without white markings, or bi-colored without one color being white. Acceptable colors with or without "tan points", include the predominate black, or chocolate, red, apricot, blue, fawn, tan, lemon, or white. Intense, dark shades of color with clearly defined and delineated coloration is preferred. White on the body is preferred to be between 10 percent and 90 percent, but all patterns; spotted, patched or splashed with white in conjunction with (or without) any combination of white on the face, head or ears are equally acceptable without prejudice. "Tan points" are common and vary in shades of cream to rust. Badger markings are acceptable. Speckling, ticking and mottling is common, but heavy ticking is undesirable. Sabling is permitted in the coat or as shading on the head or penciling on the toes. A "black mask/black muzzle", on a dog not having black as coloration is to be seriously faulted. A few white hairs do not constitute an acceptable marking. A minimum white marking consists of a patch or strip of white with underlying white/ pink skin on the forechest or body that exceeds one inch. Less than one inch of white at its widest dimension is a disqualification. Brindle or merle color patterns are disqualifications. [see last page for color chart]

> **Gait:** A ground-covering efficient trot with good reach and drive suggesting agility, speed and power. The legs are parallel at a trot, but as speed increases, the legs converge toward a center line. There should be no elbowing out, weaving or rolling action while in motion.




- A Height of the dog

A scissor bite is preferred. A level bite is acceptable.

Temperament: Keenly observant, devoted, full of energy, yet easily trained and obedient to command. The Rat Terrier is a non-sparring breed and generally friendly with other dogs, but may be reserved with strangers. Submissiveness is not a fault. Overt aggression and excessive shyness should be penalized.

Disqualifications: Any dog over six months of age measuring less than 10 inches, or over 18 inches. Any blue color in the eye(s). Cropped ears. An absence of coat (genetic hairlessness). Any suggestion of kink or curl, or coat type other than described. Solid colorations (other than white). Bi-colors without white, or dogs with a patch or strip of white measuring less than one inch at its widest dimension. Brindle or merle color patterns.




